CHELAN COUNTY ORGANIZATIONS **\$298,000**

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$75,000**
Maintaining Chelan Uplake Trails

The Chelan Ranger District will use this grant to maintain 195 miles of trail in Glacier Peak and Lake Chelan-Sawtooth Wilderness areas, Sawtooth and Domke Lake Roadless areas, and Lucerne-Holden Village Scenic Corridor. Crews will remove fallen trees, clean drainage structures, and remove loose rock. The trails are used for backpacking, stock packing, hiking, snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, mountain biking, and motorcycling. Crews also will provide heavy maintenance on 20 miles of trail, especially along Devore Creek, Horton Butte, 10 Mile Falls, Holden area, and Summit trails. Heavy maintenance includes removing overgrown bushes, repairing trail surfaces, fixing drainage structures, repairing bridges and signs. The ranger district will contribute \$66,000 in staff labor, materials, and donations of labor and materials. (11-1326)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$60,000**
Maintaining Multi-Use Trails

The Wenatchee River Ranger District will use this grant to maintain its multi-use, motorized trails in the Chiwawa, Chikamin, Devils Gulch, Tronsen Ridge, Icicle Ridge, and Freund Canyon areas. These trails, totaling nearly 120 miles, are available to motorcyclists, mountain bikers, horses, and hikers. The grant will pay for a work crew and a mini-excavator. The crew will address backlog maintenance needs such as severe rutting and erosion, as well as accomplish annual maintenance tasks. The ranger district will contribute \$62,300 in cash, a state grant, and donations of labor. (11-1437)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$42,000**
Maintaining the Nason Ridge Trail System

The Wenatchee River Ranger District will use this grant to provide heavy maintenance of the Nason Ridge Trail system, including the Nason Ridge, Snowy Creek, Rock Mountain, Merritt Lake, and Round Mountain trails. Extensive trail maintenance is necessary to bring these trails to an acceptable condition, especially in sections used by motorcycles. Trail erosion and overgrown brush have become substantial problems. This system of trails along State Highway 2 east of Stevens Pass is used by a wide variety of non-motorized trail visitors. Its views and height make the area popular for mountain bikers and large groups, such as church groups and scout troops, who are excluded from Congressionally designated wilderness areas. The ranger district will contribute \$42,200 in cash, a state grant, and donations of labor. (11-1420)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$73,000**
Maintaining Wilderness Trails

The Entiat Ranger District will use this grant to maintain for two years, 44 miles of non-motorized, non-wilderness trails in the North Fork and Pyramid Mountain areas; 56 miles of wilderness trails in the Entiat Meadows, Larch Lakes, and Ice Lake areas; and 5 miles of hiker-only trails. Crews will remove fallen trees, maintain drainage structures, and repair trail surfaces. Extra work will be done on the 32 miles of the district's wilderness trails that were damaged severely by the Tinpan Fire. The ranger district will contribute \$71,740 in equipment, labor, and donations of labor. (11-1404)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$10,000**
Providing Lake Wenatchee and Entiat Snow Rangers

The Entiat Ranger District will use this grant to provide two teams of safety and education snowmobile patrols on weekends in the winter. The patrols educate trail users on safe and courteous operation, including safe travel speeds, avalanche awareness, winter survival, and respect of other trail travelers. They also help minimize conflicts between users. Teams will help maintain more than 250 safety signs and hand out tread lightly information and area maps. Patrol rangers also will help the county put on snowmobile safety classes in Puyallup and Lake Wenatchee. The Entiat and Lake Wenatchee Ranger Districts groom more than 200 miles of snowmobile trails weekly. Last winter, more than 40,000 snowmobilers used this trail system and facilities. The ranger district will contribute \$19,720 in staff labor, a state grant, and donations of equipment and labor. (11-1408)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$38,000**
Repairing Wildhorse and Whitepine Trails

The Wenatchee River Ranger District will use this grant to pay for crews and equipment to maintain the Wildhorse and lower Whitepine trails. Many sections of the trails have become deeply eroded, extremely brushy, and unsafe. Also, several creek crossings have become difficult, with steep approaches and exits, very muddy sections of trail, and poor footing. Bringing this trail up to standard will allow for continued access to a very scenic and popular section of the Alpine Lakes Wilderness, which is used by hikers, backpackers, horse riders, and hunters. The ranger district will contribute \$49,100 in cash, a federal grant, and donations of labor. (11-1432)

Jones Creek Trail Riders Association **Grant Awarded: \$20,000**
Maintaining the Jones Creek ORV Trail

The Jones Creek Trail Riders Association will use this grant to maintain the Jones Creek ORV Trail in the Yacolt State Forest, which is near Vancouver. Crews will harden damaged sections of trail by adding blocks, rock, and erosion controls to stabilize the trails and eliminate damage to local streams and vegetation. Due to significantly increased use, the trail system is in need of more maintenance. The trail system includes 15 miles of double track trail, available to all-terrain vehicles, motorcycles, horses, hikers, and mountain bikers. The association will contribute \$10,000 in donations of equipment and labor. (11-1342)

Pacific Northwest Trail Association **Grant Awarded: \$70,089**
Hiring a North Cascades Youth Crew

The Pacific Northwest Trail Association will use this grant to hire a 5-person youth crew and crew leader to maintain the Pacific Northwest National Scenic Trail and its major feeder trails through Island, Skagit, and Whatcom Counties. For the past 11 years, agencies have relied on the Pacific Northwest Trail Association, its volunteers, and youth crews to maintain trails. Not only has this benefitted the agencies, but it has provided a hands-on, outdoor experience for youth and helped them to become better stewards of the environment. Community support for this program comes from Starbucks, REI, Puget Sound Energy, U.S. Navy, Backcountry Horsemen local chapters, county parks, local schools, Cascade Job Corps, Boy Scouts, and county commissioners in all three counties. The trail association will contribute \$72,500 in donations of equipment and labor. (11-1253)

Backcountry Horsemen of Washington **Grant Awarded: \$15,000**
Fixing Anderson Lake State Park Trails

The Backcountry Horsemen of Washington will use this grant maintain up to 8 miles of trail in Anderson Lake State Park. The park includes a 70-acre lake and several trails, each with problem wet sections. The Savage Memorial Trail crosses the park and is essential to any of the loop routes in the park. The water table has been rising each

year making the memorial trail unsafe or unpleasant. The grant will pay for gravel, materials, and small equipment to harden, raise, and repair the worst sections of the trails. This park's trail system will be a key component of two cross-county trail systems, the Olympic Discovery Trail and the Pacific Northwest National Scenic Trail. The Backcountry Horsemen will contribute \$17,000 from a grant and donations of equipment, labor, and materials. (11-1324)

EarthCorps **Grant Awarded: \$10,774**

Maintaining the Dutch Miller Gap Trail

EarthCorps will use this grant to support a six-person crew to maintain the 7.4-mile Dutch Miller Gap Trail in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness area for two years. The crew will remove fallen trees and overgrown bushes, clear drainage structures, and fix trail surfaces. This trail maintenance is critical to protect the natural resources of the surrounding wilderness from further damage. The remote location of the trail and tight budgets make it difficult for the Forest Service to perform annual maintenance. The trail has not been maintained in the past three years. EarthCorps will contribute \$10,860 from a state grant and donations of cash and labor. (11-1217)

Earthcorps **Grant Awarded: \$35,425**

Funding Wilderness Trail Maintenance

Earthcorps will use this grant to support four, six- to seven-person crews to maintain 8 miles of trail for two years. The crews will remove fallen trees and overgrown bushes and fix drainage structures in the Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest. The crews will complete trail maintenance on the Surprise Mountain Trail, Deception Creek Trail, and a 3.5-mile section of the Pacific Crest Trail. The corps will contribute \$35,456 from a state grant and donations of cash and labor. (11-1186)

U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$10,000** **Hiring a Coordinator for the Snoqualmie Volunteer Ranger Program**

The Snoqualmie Ranger District will use this grant to hire a seasonal volunteer program coordinator. The program coordinator recruits, trains, supervises, and provides logistical support for volunteer rangers patrolling the Alpine Lakes, Clearwater, and Norse Peak Wilderness and surrounding backcountry. Volunteer rangers provide information to visitors and promote safety in the backcountry and protection of the environment. They help maintain trails, campsites, toilets, signs, and bulletin boards. Volunteers also help with community outreach programs including walks, talks, work parties, slide shows, and visitor center displays, interpretive programs, and environmental education efforts. This grant will fund salary, per diem for the volunteer coordinator, and supplies for the Volunteer Ranger Program for one year. More than 100,000 visitors use trails in the

ranger district each year. For the past 10 years, 30 to 50 volunteers have donated between 3,000 and 5,000 hours each season. The ranger district will contribute \$36,835 in cash, staff labor, and donated equipment and labor. (11-1248)

U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$75,000**
Hiring a Crew for Snoqualmie-White River Trail Maintenance

The Snoqualmie Ranger District will use this grant to hire a four-person crew and pay for supplies, equipment, and tools to maintain 230 miles of multi-use trails. The crew will remove fallen trees and overgrown bushes, repair trail surfaces, and fix drainage structures. There has been little to no federal money for trail maintenance for several years. The ranger district will contribute \$115,000 in equipment, labor, materials, and donations of labor. (11-1293)

U.S. Forest Service, Mount Baker National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$75,000**
Maintaining Alpine Lakes Trails

The Snoqualmie Ranger District will use this grant to maintain 125 miles of trail in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness and surrounding backcountry. Crews will include staff and non-profit organizations and volunteers including Mountains to Sound Greenway, EarthCorps, Washington Trails Association, Pacific Northwest Trail Association, Backcountry Horsemen of Washington, Boy Scouts, and local school groups. Work will include removing overgrown bushes, repairing drainage structures, and fixing trail surfaces. The work will mean safer trails, reduced erosion and plant loss, preservation of trail structures, longer life for trail facilities, and enhanced public access for outdoor recreation activities. More than 100,000 visitors use this trail system each year. The ranger district will contribute \$64,805 in equipment, labor, materials, and donations of labor and materials. (11-1249)

Mountains to Sound Greenway **Grant Awarded: \$75,000**
Maintaining Trails in the Mountains to Sound Greenway

The Mountains to Sound Greenway will use this grant to pay for materials, tools, and staff to maintain 60 miles of trail in the greenway, some of the most heavily used trails in the state. Work includes removing fallen trees and overgrown bushes, replacing signs, and fixing damaged trail surfaces and drainage structures. Crews will maintain the Mount Si, Little Si, West Tiger #3, Rattlesnake Ledge, Rattlesnake Mountain, Swamp, Big Tree, and Twin Falls Trails; the first 2 miles of some U.S. Forest Service trails along the south and middle forks of the Snoqualmie River; and the remainder of the trails in the Mount Si Natural Resources Conservation Area. The Mountains to Sound Greenway will contribute \$75,000 in staff labor, grants, and donations of labor. (11-1255)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$10,000**
Hiring Rangers for the Cle Elum Winter Trail Patrol

The Cle Elum Ranger District will use this grant to hire two education and safety snow rangers to patrol 21 sno-parks and staging areas, 500 miles of groomed winter trails, and about 300,000 acres of backcountry areas open to snowmobiling. In addition, these rangers will educate users about safe and courteous operation, trail conditions, avalanche awareness, winter survival, respect for wilderness and other non-motorized areas, and trail etiquette. The Cle Elum Ranger District is arguably the busiest winter recreation destination in Washington because of its easy access via Interstate 90 and good snow conditions. With thousands of users each season, minimizing user conflicts, and providing education and safety messages is a very high priority. The ranger district will contribute \$26,000 in donated and staff labor and a state grant. (11-1382)

U.S. Forest Service, Wenatchee National Forest **Grant Awarded: \$8,424**
Providing Snoqualmie Pass Winter Education Patrol

The Cle Elum Ranger District will use this grant to pay for two backcountry rangers at Snoqualmie Pass. The rangers will provide information on sno-parks and talk with backcountry skiers, snowmobilers, snowboarders, sledders, hikers, climbers, and snowshoers using the trails. They also will lead educational snowshoe walks into the backcountry with the goal of teaching users about winter safety, avalanche danger, route finding, and winter ecology. One of the rangers will serve as the volunteer coordinator, supervising up to 20 volunteers. Common problems in the winter backcountry are lack of avalanche training, oversized groups in the Alpine Lake Wilderness, winter preparedness and safety, and a need for general route finding and sno-park information. Fatalities and injuries from avalanches and lost winter recreationists have increased the need for more education. The ranger district will contribute \$10,111 in donated and staff labor. (11-1412)

Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission **Grant Awarded: \$47,065**
Grooming Snowmobile Trails from Snoqualmie Pass to Blewett Pass

State Parks will use this grant to groom 402 miles of snowmobile trails in the central Cascade Mountains of eastern King and western Kittitas Counties between Snoqualmie and Blewett Passes. Typically, trails are groomed at least once or twice a week or more in the winter. It is expected that up to 9,506 grooming miles will be logged each winter. The trail systems in this area are in the Okanogan-Wenatchee National Forest. The number of registered snowmobiles has declined in the past few years, and grooming funds will be reduced by up to 19 percent. State Parks will contribute \$188,260. (11-1233)

The abandoned road bed is needed by the Washington State Department of Natural Resources, which plans to re-establish the road. A new concrete outhouse will be placed on the other side of the cabin, and a stairway and porch built to access it. The cabin is used by thousands of visitors every year. The Methow Ranger District will use this grant to pay for crews for two years to maintain 35 miles of multi-use, motorized trails and nearly 10 miles of non-motorized trails in the Sawtooth backcountry on the east slope of the north Cascade Mountains and adjacent to the Lake Chelan-Sawtooth Wilderness area. Crews will remove fallen trees and overgrown bushes, repair trail surfaces, maintain drainage structures, and remove rocks. The trails are used by hikers, mountain bikers, equestrians, and motorcyclists. The ranger district will contribute \$8,250 in donations of equipment and labor. (11-1288)

Maintaining Trails in the Methow Ranger District

With more than 1,200 miles of trail, the current federal funding and fees allow the district to clear only about 150 miles of trail. Several large wildfires and avalanches have covered the trails with debris, obliterated other trails, and hindered the district's ability to keep the trails clean. Crews have had to return several times to the same trail to maintain safety and limit damage to the environment. This grant combined with federal Northwest Forest Pass collections will pay for a two-person trail crew and a two-person front country patrol and facility maintenance crew, along with supplies and materials. The crews will maintain and operate existing equipment, build drainage structures, and haul rocks and materials. The grant also will pay for contract services to pump the toilets, rent dumpsters, and take water samples. The ranger district will contribute \$69,000 in equipment, labor, materials, and donations of equipment and labor. (11-1294)

Northwest Glacier Cruisers **Grant Awarded: \$12,153**
Grooming and Maintaining Mount Baker Trails

The Northwest Glacier Cruisers will use this grant to increase the amount of grooming by 25 days each year for two years of snowmobile trails in the Skagit Program (Mount Baker National Recreation Area, Anderson Creek/Watson, Finney Creek, and Segelsen Creek) in Skagit and Whatcom Counties and the Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest. The area historically receives the first snow of the season and the deepest snowfall, extending the season longer than any area in the state. The U.S. Forest Service counted more than 20,000 snowmobilers on the trails during the last season. The Skagit Program is unique because the 165 miles of trails open to more than 16,000 acres of backcountry, used by snowmobilers, snowshoers, dog sledgers, hikers, and skiers. All users get to the backcountry via the groomed trails. Funding from the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission for the snowmobile grooming program has decreased from 80 days of grooming to 35 days. The current frequency of grooming is far below what is required for this high use area. Increases grooming will improve safety. The Northwest Glacier Cruisers will contribute \$50,800 in material, equipment, and labor. (11-1222)

Maintaining Walker Valley Off-Road Vehicle Trails

The Department of Natural Resources will use this grant to hire a six-person crew and buy supplies and materials to maintain the 36-mile, 8,000-acre Walker Valley off-road vehicle trails. The crew will focus on repairing and maintaining trail drainage and erosion control features. The crew is needed to address a backlog of maintenance work that was created by increased use when other areas closed. The Darrington Ranger District will use this grant to maintain 150 miles of trails off the Mountain Loop Scenic Byway and portions of the Pacific Crest Trail and its access trails. Many of these trails begin at low elevation and climb steep slopes or enter wilderness areas at some point. Maintenance costs are high due to a combination of high use, poor soils, wet climate, and steep, rugged slopes. Volunteers work on the lower portions of many of these trails but often are unable to reach the upper areas. Crews will remove fallen trees and overgrown bushes, repair bridge handrails and trail surfaces, move small sections of trail, and maintain drainage structures. Nooksack Nordic Ski Club Maintaining Salmon Ridge Ski Trails

Grant Awarded: \$21,300

The Nooksack Nordic Ski Club will use this grant to groom and maintain 15 miles of ski trails and maintain 3 miles of snowshoe trails in the Salmon Ridge trail system during the next two years. Crews will clear brush and overhanging branches, mow, repair drainage systems, and install trail signs. The Salmon Ridge Trail system provides the only groomed and tracked cross-country ski trails in western Washington north of Stevens Pass. Additionally, it has become a popular site for snowshoers. This area is on the flank of Mount Baker and attracts more than 7,200 visits each winter. The 15-mile trail system is taken care of by the Nooksack Nordic Ski Club. This is the club's 19th season as stewards of the Salmon Ridge Ski area. The ski club will contribute \$19,900 from a state grant and donations of equipment, labor, and materials. (11-1221)

Grant Awarded: \$10,000

The Mount Baker Ranger District will use this grant to hire a volunteer coordinator for the Mountain Steward Program, which is a volunteer program dedicated to the education of visitors on three of the busiest trail systems in the district. The trails are in the Mount Baker Wilderness and National Recreation Area, and around the Heather Meadows area. Mountain stewards hike the trails to educate visitors about safety, wilderness ethics, minimizing their environmental impacts, forest regulations, and

features of the area. Volunteers have made more than 18,400 visitor contacts in the past nine seasons that the program has been operating. The Mountain Steward coordinator will manage the program, provide training, organize supplies and materials, perform check-in procedures, and support volunteers during their participation in the program. The ranger district will contribute \$13,500 in donated and staff labor. (11-1338)

Hiring a Mount Baker Climbing Ranger

The Mount Baker Ranger District will use this grant to hire a second climbing ranger to work in a rope team on the mountain. As a rope team, the two rangers will be able to access camps and routes, and the summit, to interact with climbers. One ranger working alone cannot safely access all the areas on Mount Baker used by climbers. As a skilled and experienced rope team, the rangers will contact the public and educate them on how to minimize their impacts on the environment, including proper waste disposal and campsite selection, and safe climbing practices such as roping up on glaciers. Thousands of climbers attempt to reach the mountain summit at 10,781 feet each season. The climb is physically challenging and all the routes require technical mountaineering skills. Experienced climbing rangers will work as a team interacting with the public to reduce resource degradation, promote proper climber preparedness and increase safe climbing practices on Mount Baker. The ranger district will contribute \$14,210 in donated and staff labor. (11-1339)

Providing for Cle Elum Wilderness Education

The Cle Elum Ranger District will use this grant to hire one wilderness ranger to help patrol trails, campsites, and lakeshores in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness Area. Rangers explain principles designed to reduce impacts on the environment and protect the trail and adjacent wilderness areas. They also explain regulations, provide information to the public, design brochures and trail head posters, coordinate volunteers, teach trail etiquette to minimize conflicts, and demonstrate safe backcountry travel techniques. Other duties include documenting trail conditions to address safety concerns and maintenance needs. The Cle Elum Ranger District administers 86,000 acres of the Alpine Lakes Wilderness. The wilderness and adjacent area contains 12 trail heads, 157 miles of trail, numerous high country routes, more than 60 lake destinations, and

more than 750 wilderness campsites. The area receives more than 27,000 visits a year. The ranger district will contribute \$10,500 in donated and staff labor. (11-1281)

Hiring an Olympic Youth Crew to Maintain Trails

The Pacific Northwest Trail Association will use this grant to support crews that maintain 120 miles of the Pacific Northwest National Scenic Trail on the Olympic Peninsula, through Jefferson and Clallam Counties. Crews will work from Snow Creek/Mount Zion through Gold Creek, the Upper Dungeness, and the Buckhorn Wilderness, to the Olympic National Park boundary; the High and Low Divide trails on the Upper Solduc; and the upper and lower Bogachiel River. The trail crews include the SKY Program for at-risk youth. This project is supported by the U.S. Forest Service; National Park Service; Chimicum, Port Townsend, Port Angeles, and Forks School Districts; Jefferson and Clallam County commissioners; and the Backcountry Horsemen of Washington. Evergreen Mountain Bike Alliance **Grant Awarded: \$29,000**
Supporting a Volunteer Trail Maintenance Program

The Evergreen Mountain Bike Alliance will use this grant to support and expand its statewide volunteer trail maintenance program. Evergreen will provide at least 4,500 hours of volunteer labor for popular trails important to mountain bikers, hikers, and equestrians covering more than 100 miles of trails across the state. Because of a lack of funding, many of these trails receive no maintenance beyond what the mountain bike community performs. The alliance will contribute \$82,500 in equipment, labor, and donations of cash and labor. (11-1259)

Washington Trails Association **Grant Awarded: \$75,000**
Supporting Backcountry Trail Maintenance Teams

The Washington Trails Association will use this grant to support at least 45 volunteer backcountry trail teams working throughout the Cascade and Olympic Mountains, and from the northernmost reaches of the Salmo-Priest Wilderness to scenic Bird Creek Meadows near Mount Adams on the Yakama Nation. Crews will maintain more than 100 miles of backcountry trails open to hikers and equestrians. They will remove fallen trees, fix drainage structures, cut overgrown bushes, and repair trail surfaces. The trail teams work on trails that lie beyond the reach of a single day trip. This allows backcountry crews to tackle difficult maintenance projects or to clear trails so the backcountry can open as soon as the snow melts. The association will contribute \$223,000 in donations of cash and labor. (11-1307)

Providing Front Country Trail Maintenance

The Washington Trails Association will use this grant to support volunteer trail maintenance on more than 100 trails across the state. Volunteers will maintain drainage structure, repair damaged trail surfaces, remove overgrown bushes and fallen trees, and perform other maintenance tasks. The association will manage 250 work parties,

generating more than 25,000 volunteer hours, on trails throughout the Cascade and Olympic Mountains and in eastern Washington, focusing on popular day hike routes, accessible from the major cities around Puget Sound and southwest Washington. The association will contribute \$375,000 in donations of cash and labor. (11-1308)

Washington Water Trails Association **Grant Awarded: \$5,000**
Supporting Water Trail SEA Kayaker Team Educators

The Washington Water Trails Association will use this grant to pay for an education program in the Puget Sound. Funding will pay for the association's Sound Education and Action (SEA) Kayaker Team and support a second training program about not impacting the environment for one year. The association will target the public, especially users of non-motorized boats and shoreline trail heads along the Cascadia Marine Trail, water trail on Puget Sound with more than 50 campsites. Canoeing and kayaking is projected to increase more than 30 percent by 2023. With less than 17 percent of Puget Sound's shoreline accessible for boat launch, this growth will be concentrated in extremely limited areas, multiplying the impacts of users on erosion, wildlife disturbance, and water quality. To minimize impacts it is vital for this growing population to be informed about how to not impact the environment. The association will contribute \$7,500 in cash, staff labor, and a grant. Washington Trails Association **Grant Awarded: \$25,000**
Supporting Youth Trail Maintenance Projects

The Washington Trails Association will use this grant to support five youth projects to maintain trails such as those in or near Wild Sky Wilderness, Cape Disappointment State Park, Deception Pass State Park, and Mount Rainier National Park. By completing basic trail maintenance, the kids learn trail maintenance skills as well as self-reliance and confidence. The Washington Trails Association fields more than 45 volunteer vacations each year, helping to maintain some of the state's most beloved trails. Youth Volunteer Vacations will place 16 teams of young adults, ages 14 -18, in both front country locations such as national forests, national parks, and state parks as well as our more advanced backcountry locations such as the Pacific Crest Trail in the Alpine Lakes Wilderness and at Hart Lake in the Glacier Peak Wilderness. The trail association will contribute \$50,300 in donations of cash and labor. (11-1305)
